Church Electoral Roll revision

Every year, we update our Electoral Roll. This is the official Church membership list, which all Church of England churches need to compile. If your name is already on the Electoral Roll, you don't need to do anything – you will stay on automatically (unless you would like to come off; if so, please contact us). If you are not yet on the Electoral Roll, please do consider joining.

We would recommend joining the Roll because:

- 1. It allows you to vote at our Annual Meeting, which takes place on Sunday 26th May.
- 2. It allows you to stand for election to the PCC or Churchwarden.
- 3. It is about belonging. It is a way of saying, this is my Church family and I belong here.

You can join the Roll if you are:

- 1. Baptised.
- 2. Aged 16 or over.
- 3. Resident in the parish OR worship with us regularly (or would usually worship with us, but are prevented from coming to Church, perhaps because of age or illness).

There are set dates for the revision of the Roll. The revision opens on Sunday 14th April and closes on Sunday 5th May. There will be forms available during this time for those who wish to join the Roll. Please speak to our Electoral Roll Officer, Jane Dougan, for more details (jmd8@post.com).

Car parking on the church drive.

Thought for the Month by Chris Selden:

A couple of weeks ago I bought a new bottle of golden syrup, and saw that the company had changed their label. No surprise in that; all companies update their artwork eventually. However, the old labels had for many years showed a dead lion, relating to an event in the Old Testament when Samson killed a lion and later found bees living in the corpse and making honey.

I don't work in marketing, but I expect this imagery will have been questioned many times: the Samson story is about honey, so why put it on our syrup? ...and does a rotting animal carcass really represent the quality of our product? But the decision was taken, the new labels were rolled out, and I since found out that various people (including numerous Christian groups) made a lot of noise on social media about the removal of the old Samson logo. That's not the part which interested me. What interested me is that the new image is the stylised face of a lion; not dead this time, but looking noble and very much alive. Aside from Samson, the lion is itself a popular biblical image – used over 100 times, sometimes relating to the actual animal, but other times as a simile relating to strength or ferocity. God kept Daniel safe when thrown to the lions. David recalls killing lions while working as a shepherd. The image of a lion resting with an ox illustrates a future peace. In Genesis the tribe of Judah is likened to a lion cub, and as King David was from the tribe of Judah the expected Messiah descended from his tribe was sometimes thought of as "The Lion of Judah"; a leader who would rule with authority and strength. The New Testament book of Revelation emphasises that Jesus is this Lion of Judah; that He is the only one worthy to receive blessing and honour and glory and power.

Easter gives us an opportunity to not only reflect on the sacrificial death of Jesus, but on His resurrection and the new life that He offers to all of us. As we move on from Easter we do not commemorate the decomposing body of a defeated leader, but we worship Jesus who is the risen Lion of Judah.

Whether the marketing department intended it or not, maybe that new and living lion still gives us something we can reflect on as we look at our syrup bottles.
